A cold front will slowly move into central WA overnight, bringing rain to WA and northwestern OR. Most areas should remain MVFR or better through the night.

SIGNIFICANT WEATHER NARRATIVE FOR TERMINALS THROUGH 12Z

SEA	Rain continuing overnight with ceilings slowly falling to 010-015 by 12z. Winds will be from the south 6 knots or less.
PDX	Patchy light rain is possible overnight with ceilings generally around 050 or higher. Winds will be from the southeast 6 knots or less.
GEG	Ceilings will fall to 020-040 overnight. Winds will be from the southeast 5 knots or less.
